# April 2017 Referenda Results

 No additional revenue available to support nursing home operations

 County Board has authority to decide what the disposition of the home will be

## Moving Forward

- Stabilization of CCNH finances, management
- Disposition evaluation and approval process

## Challenges

- Cash flow: \$100,000/month Medicaid shortfall
- Accounts payable increasing
- Declining census impacting revenue (147)
- Consolidation and wing closure almost complete
- Employee and resident uncertainty

#### Stabilization Issues

- Financial
  - Business Operations
- Management
  - Compliance
  - Patient Services
  - Employee Assistance (crisis management)

- Status quo
- Downsize by 50% (or more)
- Increase operating levy
- Implement 1/4 cent facilities sales tax
- Sell or lease
- Close

#### Sell CCNH

- RFP/RFI for broker
- Evaluation process for home bidder proposals
  - Define objectives
  - Employee involvement
- Not-for-profit option
- May need debt issuance to finance wind down
- Conclude sale within 9-12 months



#### Sell CCNH

- Estimated valuation: \$9.9 million to \$12.7 million
- Proceeds to pay:
  - \$3 million accounts payable
  - \$500,000-1 million IMRF/FICA
  - \$250k employee benefits
  - \$6.6 million principal (construction bond)
  - \$2.5 million principal (remediation bond)
  - Broker commission



#### Close

- Final option
- If cannot sell, home will be closed
- Estimated closure cost \$14 million under Scenario 3



#### Downsize

- Two scenarios
  - Three units: 102 beds available (48 Medicaid)
  - One unit: 59 beds available (36 Medicaid)
- Assumes State catches up on Medicaid, keep private pay/VA/ Medicare patients
- Doesn't address \$3 million accounts payable
- Loss of 73-85 Medicaid patients, 136-164 employees laid off
- Huge risk
