YARP Program Description

- The RPC's Young Adult Reentry Program
 (YARP) is a Workforce Development
 program funded by the U.S. Department of
 Labor Employment and Training
 Administration.
- YARP uses a holistic and evidence-based approach to help justice-involved young adults in high-crime, high-poverty communities in Champaign County obtain a secondary or post-secondary education, as well as training that leads to an industryrecognized credential and the ability to obtain and retain better jobs.









What Services Will Be Provided?

Education

College/career counseling

Career Development

Career pathway exploration

SPARC's (Structural Psychotherapy for Adolescents Responding to Chronic Stress)

These are 16 guided group sessions that focus on the emotional, social, academic, and behavioral functions of participants exposed to chronic interpersonal trauma.

MRT (Moral Recognition Therapy)

Designed to facilitate a change in processing one's conscious decision-making and enhance appropriate behavior through development of higher moral reasoning for participants.

Follow-up services for participant successes

These services last for 12 months following completion of the program.




What Areas Will Be Served And Who We Serve

Expected Outcomes Of The Program

- **Enrollment Rate:** Our goal is to serve **188** customers within a three-year period of the program.
- Recidivism Rate: Our goal is to assist the customers and to contribute meeting their goals. This includes providing ways to avoid being re-arrested for a new crime or re-incarcerated. We aim to lower this rate 20%, which is roughly half of the national recidivism rate of 44.1%.
- Credential Attainment Rate: Our goal is to enroll customers in an educational recognized postsecondary credential, a secondary school diploma or its recognized equivalent, or training program (excluding those in on-the-job training (OJT) and customized training). The goal for this measure is 60% of those enrolled in degree and/or credential-awarding programs that are successfully completed within one year after exit from the YARP program.







YARP Intake Process

Referrals and Applications:



- Participants can be referred, recruited, or voluntarily apply.
- The application is reviewed for completeness and assigned to a career planner.
- Participant is then contacted by a career planner to complete assessment, testing, and enrollment into services.
