Applications for Champaign County Area Rural Transit System (C-CARTS)

Requested Action: Approve the Resolution Authorizing Execution and Amendment of Section 5311 Grant Agreement, Public Transportation Applicant Ordinance, and Acceptance of Special Warranty as part of the Federal and State grant applications for Fiscal Year 2022 continued operation of Champaign County Area Rural Transit System (CCARTS).

Background: To continue to receive rural public transportation operating funding, Champaign County is required to submit grant applications annually for FTA section 5311 (Rural Public Transportation) and IL Downstate Operating Assistance Program (DOAP). These grants are awarded based on the Illinois Department of Transportation's (IDOT) Fiscal Year (July 1, 2021 - June 30, 2022). The separate applications were prepared by RPC staff with input from Champaign-Urbana Mass Transit District staff and will be submitted online.

FY21 SECTION 5311 AND DOAP GRANT APPLICATION BUDGET

Allocated federal funding for FY2022 is \$153,871, while the awarded DOAP funding is \$1,102,129. Total available funding is \$1,125,600; however, the amount of DOAP funding that Champaign County and its operator can obtain will depend on their ability to source local match funding. In order to be realistic, the FY2022 budget is based on actual expenditures, and the amount of DOAP requested is \$723,852. This means the total federal and state request for FY2022 is \$877,723, which is the same amount of requested in FY2021.

BUDGET VARIANCES

Each year a budget variances letter is submitted to IDOT explaining the reason for budget line item variances of 10% or greater. Below is a detailed summary of the budget variances from FY2021 to FY2022.

NOTEWORTHY GRANT APPLICATION ITEMS

IDOT changed the 5311 and DOAP grant application to be completely online this year. In lieu of submitting portions of the grant application with this memo, a list of the noteworthy items are cited below:

- Champaign County acquired no additional vehicles since the previous grant cycle last year.
- C-CARTS is currently revenue free due to COVID-19 pandemic.
- C-CARTS will continue operating Monday through Friday from 6:00am to 6:00pm.
- The projected miles are 310,000 and projected trips are 32,000.

AUTHORIZING EXECUTION AND AMENDMENT OF SECTION 5311 GRANT AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, the provision of public transit service is essential to the people of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, 49 U.S.C. § 5311 ("Section 5311"), makes funds available to the State of Illinois to help offset certain operating deficits and administrative expenses of a system providing public transit service in non-urbanized areas; and

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois, acting by and through the Illinois Department of Transportation, is authorized by 30 ILCS 740/3-1 *et seg.* to provide the Section 5311 grant; and

WHEREAS, grants for said funds will impose certain obligations upon the recipient, including the provision by it of the local share of funds necessary to cover costs not covered by funds provided under Section 5311 or the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF CHAMPAIGN COUNTY:

- Section 1. That an application be made to the Office of Intermodal Project Implementation, Department of Transportation, State of Illinois, for a financial assistance grant under Section 5311 and the Act for fiscal year 2021, for the purpose of off-setting a portion of the Public Transportation Program operating expenses and deficits of Champaign County.
- Section 2. That while participating in said operating assistance program, Champaign County will provide all required local match funds.
- Section 3. That the Champaign County Executive is authorized to execute and file on behalf of Champaign County such application.
- Section 4. That the Champaign County Executive is authorized to furnish such additional information as may be required by the Office of Intermodal Project Implementation and the Federal Transit Administration in connection with the aforesaid application for said grant.
- Section 5. That the Champaign County Executive is authorized to execute and file on behalf of Champaign County a Section 5311-Downstate Operating Assistance Grant Agreement ("Agreement") with the Illinois Department of Transportation and amend such Agreement, if necessary, in order to obtain grant assistance under the provisions of Section 5311 and the Act for fiscal year 2021.
- Section 6. That the Champaign County Executive is authorized to provide such information and to file such documents as may be required to perform the Agreement and to receive the grant for fiscal year 2021.

Public Transportation Applicant Ordinance

ORDINANCE NUMBER:

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION IN CHAMPAIGN COUNTY, ILLINOIS

Whereby, public transportation is an essential public purpose for which public funds may be expended under Article 13, Section 7 of the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, Champaign County wishes to provide public transportation for its citizens and become eligible for grants from the State of Illinois or any department or agency thereof, from any unit of local government, from the Federal government or any department or agency thereof; and

WHEREAS, Illinois Compiled Statutes 740/2-1 et seq. authorizes a county to provide for public transportation within the (county or counties) limits:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED that:

- Section 1. Champaign County shall hereby provide public transportation within the (county or counties) limits.
- Section 2. The clerk/secretary of the governing board of Champaign County shall file a certified copy of this Ordinance, within sixty days after passage of this ordinance.
- Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval, as required by law.
- Section 4. That the Champaign County Executive is authorized to execute and file on behalf of Champaign County a Grant Application to the Illinois Department of Transportation.
- Section 5. That the Champaign County Executive is authorized to execute and file on behalf of Champaign County all required Grant Agreements with the Illinois Department of Transportation.

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BACKGROUND

The Champaign County Highway Department's pavement management system (PMS) objectively evaluates, assesses, and manages approximately 400 lane-miles of County-maintained roads in Champaign County. Applied Research Associates, Inc. (ARA) implemented and manages the PMS through a multiyear contract with the County. In addition to providing an objective means of evaluating roadway conditions and optimizing limited construction funds, the County's PMS has served as a resource for addressing other issues, including preparing for the impact of new enterprises such as windfarms that may affect County roads, selecting suitable candidates for additional funding sources when they become available, and providing construction history and condition data for project-level design purposes.

This report summarizes the 2021-25 update to the County's five-year maintenance and rehabilitation plan and long-term pavement condition forecast. ARA performed this analysis using previously collected pavement condition data and updated construction history information provided by the County. ARA will update this plan using a new round of field data collection in 2021.



Figure 1. Champaign County's PMS optimizes the expenditure of construction funds over the long-term by choosing the most appropriate treatment and timing for road improvements, such as the cold in-place recycling (CIR) planned for County Highway 15 from S.R. 130 to Sidney this year.



UPDATED RECORDS

The County Highway Department completed the following construction and maintenance activities in 2020.

Past Year Maintenance and Rehabilitation Projects

The County performed the following construction project last year:

• CH 32 (through Gifford): 2" mill and 2" asphalt concrete (AC) overlay

In addition, the County performed chip sealing on four roads:

- CH 13 (entire length)
- CH 16 (entire length)
- CH 23 (entire length)
- CH 25 (entire length)

Funding Updates

Based on conversations with the County Engineer, we have increased the construction budget to \$3.8 million per year to account for increased MFT and annual federal contributions.



PAVEMENT CONDITION




Figure 2. AC overlay deterioration curve developed based on Champaign County data.

The County's PMS uses the Pavement Condition Index (PCI) to characterize pavement condition and for selection of the optimal treatment and timing of improvements. In 2019 we performed this condition survey using an automated digital survey vehicle (DSV) that collected images on 100 percent of Champaign County's highway network. For the current analysis, ARA projected pavement deterioration based on the prediction curve in figure 2, which has been updated to include data from previous years' surveys. In general, new or resurfaced roads begin at a PCI of 100 and deteriorate over time at a rate similar to the curve, with a typical AC overlay life of 17 years.




Figure 3. 2020 PCI ratings (end of year projection).

Figure 3 shows the spatial distribution of PCI values by section. The distribution based on lane mileage by rating is:

- Very Good (100 to 80) = 44.2 percent
- Good (<80 to 60) = 34.5 percent
- Fair (<60 to 40) = 10.9 percent
- Poor (<40 to 20) = 10.2 percent
- Very Poor (<20 to 0) = 0.2 percent

The projected end of year 2020 overall network PCI value was 76.6, corresponding to a good condition rating.

NEW CONSTRUCTION ASSURANCE TESTING

In 2020 ARA FWD tested the two sections of CH 9 that were reconstructed using 10 inches of full-depth reclamation (FDR) and a 4-inch AC overlay in 2019. This includes the section from US 45 to CR 2000E (9-3) that was previously an AC pavement in the eastbound lane and an AC overlay of rubblized concrete in the westbound lane, and the section from CR2000E to CH 32 (9-4) that was previously an AC pavement with a stabilized base in both directions. We tested the two pavements every 0.1 miles in each lane, staggered between the two traffic directions, to evaluate the rehabilitated pavement's structural response, confirm the effectiveness of its rehabilitation, and to provide a baseline for monitoring of future structural condition.




Figure 4. FWD maximum deflections on the recently rehabilitated CH 9 sections.

Figure 4 displays the maximum deflections for both sections by lane. The data show average deflections of 11.3 and 9.4 mils for sections 9-3 and 9-4, respectively, indicating good structural response. In general, lower deflections are indicative of thicker or stiffer pavements, while higher deflections reflect thinner, weaker, or more deteriorated roads. The lower deflections in section 9-4 indicate a slightly stiffer structural response, possibly due to the remainder of a portion of its stabilized base that was reported in the records review conducted as part of the original PMS implementation.

Deflections are similar between lanes, indicating equivalent pavement structures in both directions.

PMS UPDATE

ARA updated Champaign County's RoadCare PMS database with last year's maintenance and construction projects and performed a 10-year simulation of pavement deterioration and improvements to determine the projects to include in the next 5-year maintenance and rehabilitation (M&R) plan. The analysis used the following information as inputs.

Unit Costs for Treatments

Champaign County provided estimated unit cost data for typical work activities, such as placing chip seals, AC milling, and placing AC overlays. From this, ARA determined typical unit costs for each M&R alternative listed in the treatment matrix. The County provided costs on a per lane-mile basis and we subsequently converted to units of cost per square yard. Table 1 presents the estimated unit costs.

Treatment Matrix




Figure 5. The Champaign County treatment matrix.

Figure 5 shows the Champaign County treatment matrix. ARA modified the matrix from previous year's based on discussions with the County Engineer and experience gained from previous local experience. The matrix is driven by the PCI rating, with surface treatments performed early in the pavement life (maximum of two rounds) and CIR performed once the pavements have deteriorated to a condition where chip seals are no longer viable. Hot in-place recycling (HIR) is an alternative when the pavement is experiencing functional issues, such as excessive rutting or roughness, but structurally sound, as determined through deflection testing.

FIVE-YEAR M&R PLAN AND CONDITION FORECAST

Maintenance and Rehabilitation Plan

ARA updated the maintenance and rehabilitation plan by simulating pavement deterioration and improvements in RoadCare over a 10-year period. RoadCare simulates deterioration of each section based on the performance curve determined specifically for Champaign County roads and increases the condition rating accordingly for any road receiving a maintenance or construction treatment during the simulation period. RoadCare selects projects with the highest benefit-to-cost ratio that are feasible within the allocated budget. Additional anticipated funding from sources other than State MFT funds (such as Federal STR or State HSIP funds) are added to the annual \$2,500,000 MFT construction and maintenance fund. ARA and the County Engineer finalized the maintenance and rehabilitation program based on practical considerations, such as spatial distribution of selected projects and anticipated funding.




Figure 6. Rehabilitation and surface treatment plan, 2021 to 2025 (event year shown in red).

Table 2 presents the proposed 5-year plan for the current analysis period. Figure 6 presents the surface treatment and rehabilitation projects for all five years. The main rehabilitation projects for the next five years include:

- 2021: CH 15 (SR 130 to Sidney) CIR with AC overlay and safety improvements
- 2022: CH 20 (US 45 to CH 22) HIR with AC overlay
- 2023: CH 18 (US 45 to SR 130) CIR with AC overlay and safety improvements
- 2024: CH 15 (Sidney to County Line) CIR with AC overlay
- 2025: CH 12 (CH 20 to CH 11) CIR with AC overlay
- 2025: CH 24 (US 150 to CH20) CIR with AC overlay

Table 3 presents the expected pavement expenditures for the next 5 years, based on the RoadCare simulation results.

10-Year Network Condition Forecast




Figure 7. Predicted network condition for 2021 to 2030.

Figure 7 presents the RoadCare pavement condition simulation results for the next 10 years. The chart shows the predicted percentage of lane mileage in each rating category (e.g., very good, good, fair, poor, and very poor) and the predicted average network PCI. The simulation predicts that the network PCI value will hold steady over the next 10 years at an average value of 72.8 (i.e., good). The percentage of pavements in good and very good condition are expected to stay about the same, while the number of pavements in poor and very poor condition will increase slightly.

WHEREAS, The cost of replacing the aforesaid bridge, including preliminary engineering is now estimated to be \$650,000.00; and


WHEREAS, Resolution Number 2020-35, approved on February 20, 2020 appropriated \$400,000 for the replacement of this structure.


