NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH: THE BASICS

 <u>PURPOSE</u> -- To help Law Enforcement by acting as their extra set of eyes and ears to help prevent crime and vandalism and deterring criminal activity

<u>ANYONE CAN JOIN</u> -- Homeowner or renter, young or old, married or single

CAN FORM A WATCH AROUND ANY GEOGRAPHICAL UNIT – A block, entire neighborhood, apartment complex, or business area

<u>LIMITATIONS</u> – Watch groups are not vigilantes; purpose is to aid Law Enforcement



STARTING A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH: THE PHASES

PHASE ONE

 <u>Create a small planning committee</u> -- Discuss needs, the level of interest, and neighborhood issue/problems

 <u>Contact the Sheriff's Office</u> -- Have Neighborhood Watch Coordinator attend to help address any concerns or fears and provide information on criminal/suspicious activity in the neighborhood

 Hold initial neighborhood meeting -- Helps to gauge interest in the neighborhood for the formation of a Neighborhood Watch, and identify issues that need to be addressed

STARTING A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH: THE PHASES

PHASE TWO

<u>Ask for Block Captains</u> -- Volunteers who are responsible for relaying information to other members

Establish form of communication -- Phone trees, email, social media

Create a informational booklet -- Have a neighborhood map showing names, phone numbers and addresses of participating households. Update as needed

Post Neighborhood Watch Signs -- Ask Coordinator for resources

EYES AND EARS OPEN!!

Report suspicious activity

- > Subjects looking into windows or parked cars
- > Cars, Vans, or Trucks moving slowly with no apparent destination
- > Strange vehicles or people in the area
- > Unusual noises
- > Unattended children
- > Screams or arguing
- > Breaking glass





REPORT! CALL 911! METCAD

- Decribe the Event -- What, Where, When, Why, and Who's involved
- <u>Describe the Suspect</u> Race, Sex, Age, Height, Weight, Hair, Clothing, Last known direction of travel
- <u>Describe Vehicles involved</u> –
 Color, Make/Model, License
 Plate, Distinctive Characteristics,
 Last known direction of travel

TIPS FOR SUCCESS

Hold regular meetings -- Helps residents get to know each other and to decide as a group upcoming strategies and activities

<u>Cet information out quickly</u> – Needs to be timely and relevant! Share all types of news about your area to prevent rumors and false information

Sponsor neighborhood cleanups – Physical conditions like abandon cars and over grown lots contribute to crime and suspicious activities

<u>Celebrate</u> – Celebrate volunteers and their efforts. Have a block party and recognize each for their contributions
